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## Podcasting is the New Buzz-Word

With 42 million iPods in circulation, podcasting has become a buzz-word on the MSU campus. The Center for Teaching and Learning is working with ITS on a new podcasting initiative that began as a pilot phase this Spring semester. While ITS is providing the technical support, the Center for Teaching and Learning will provide support to faculty once the pilot phase has ended.

The pilot phase consists of four professors in different concentrations with varying class sizes. This was important to ensure that the pilot phase was well balanced. The professors participating include Dr. John Forde, head of the Communication Department; Dr. Stephen Foster, associate professor in the Chemistry Department; Dr. Missy Hopper, assistant professor in Curriculum and Instruction; and Dr. Michael Newman, professor with the school of Human Sciences.

To create a podcast, the professor uses one of the designated technology classroom lecterns to login to a web-based interface. There their class is entered along with lecture information. Then when the lecture begins, they select 'record' and start teaching. At the end of the class, the professor has the option to publish the podcast immediately or later. When the podcast lecture is published the students are able to access it immediately. If the professor does not teach in a technology classroom, a portable Marantz recorder is being used for the pilot phase.

One professor is taking it one step further. In Dr. Missy Hopper's methods class for future teachers, she is allowing her students to create their own podcast. It is important in her class that the students learn how to self evaluate their teaching. "I record the students' mini lesson, which is a ten to twenty minute lesson on their content area. Then they listen to it and answer about 5 questions as a form of self analysis," said Dr. Hopper.

With students being on the edge of the newest technologies, whether it is cellular phones, digital cameras, or iPods- podcasting has become second nature for many. It has also been "fun for the non-technical students; it has really stretched them and made them think of technology in different ways," said Dr. Hopper.

The portability of the iPod or other mp3 player is matchless. Students are able to listen to podcasts, music, or watch video while walking to class, exercising, or doing other activities. Students can still listen to and watch podcasts even if they do not have an mp3 player. A computer connected to the Internet and with a podcatcher such as iTunes, ensures that all students will be able to listen to available lecture podcasts.

Some professors are even planning for the future. Dr. Hopper would like to get a class set of video iPods and loan them out at the beginning of the semester and allow the students to use them. At the end of the semester, she plans to restore the iPods back to the factory settings for the next set of students to use.

The response to this initiative has been remarkable. According to Dr. Hopper, it has allowed faculty to "embrace new technology because it indicates a direction and belief of what Higher Ed should be." Professors and students alike are benefiting from the MSU podcasting features and abilities. "I didn't realize how much I would enjoy the iPod; it is a great source of self education if that is what you want to make it," said Dr. Hopper.

# CTL Joins the POD Network

The Center for Teaching and Learning recently joined the Professional and Organizational Development (POD) Network in Higher Education. The POD Network is devoted to improving teaching and learning in post-secondary education. The POD Network was founded in 1975 and has over 1500 members. With approximately 400 colleges and universities in the United States and Canada participating, the spirit of networking is embraced through publications, consulting, resources, and an annual conference.
